History of the Plaques

Lieutenant General Charles, Earl Cornwallis.

The plaque was dedicated on October 16, 1931, during the sesquicentennial celebration (150th anniversary) at Yorktown. The tablet was unveiled by Lord Stanley Wykeham Cornwallis of Norfolk, a descendent of Lieutenant General Charles, Earl Cornwallis. Whereas Great Britain had honoured General Washington by accepting from the Commonwealth of Virginia a statue and placing it in Trafalgar Square, London, demonstrating on her part 'by-gones are forgotten'. Virginia felt compelled to erect this plaque to Lord Cornwallis as a fitting and gracious act. The plaque was unveiled as a memorial to Lieutenant General Charles, Earl Cornwallis and to the valour of the British Soldiers.

Queen's Rangers.

On October 16, 2020, on the Waterfront at Yorktown, Virginia, a ceremony was held recognizing the restoration of a plaque honouring the Queen's Rangers to the public after three decades in storage. The plaque was originally a gift from the Ontario Heritage Trust, Ministry of Culture & Recreation, to Yorktown to commemorate the 200th Anniversary of the Siege. The restored plaque gives a brief history of the Queen's Rangers. Today, the Queen's York Rangers (1st American Regiment, Royal Canadian Armoured Corps) of Toronto, Canada, traces its lineage to the Queen's Rangers.
